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DEUTERONOMY IN THE PENTATEUCH

- Genesis (Creation + The Descendants of Abraham and Sarah)
- Exodus 1-18: Slavery, Deliverance, and Wilderness Wanderings
- Exodus 19-Numbers 10:10: Israel Arrives at Sinai and Receives the Torah
- $\bullet\,$ Numbers 10-Numbers 36: The Exodus generation dies in the wilderness, and a new generation is born in their place.
- Deuteronomy 1-34: Moses addresses the wilderness generation, after its journey brings it to the eastern edge of the Holy Land

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WHAT IS ISRAEL CALLED TO REMEMBER IN DEUTERONOMY? EXAMPLES	
 "Remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt, and the Lord your God brought you out from there with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm; therefore the Lord your God commanded you to keep the Sabath day" (5.13). 	
 "Just remember what the Lord your God did to Pharaoh and to all Egypt, the great trials that your eyes saw, the signs and wonders, the mighty hand and the outstretched arm by which the Lord your 	
God brought you out. The Lord your God will do the same to all the peoples of whom you are afraid" (7:18-19)	
 "Remember the long way that the Lord your God has led you these forty years in the wilderness, in order to humble you, testing you to know what was in your heart, whether or not you would keep his commandments" (8:2) 	

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"Remember, do not forget how you provoked the Lord your God to wrath in the wilderness; you
have been rebellious against the Lord from the day you came out of the land of Egypt until you
came to this place" (9:7)

WHAT IS ISRAFI	CALLED TO	REMEMBER IN	DELITERONOMY?	FXAMPLES

- "When you gather the grapes of your vineyard, do not glean what is left; it shall be for the alien, the orphan, and the widow. Remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt; therefore I am commanding you to do this." (24:21)
- "You shall not deprive a resident alien or an orphan of justice; you shall not take a widow's garment in pledge. Remember that you were a slave in Egypt and the Lord your God redeemed you from there; therefore I command you to do this. When you reap your harvest in your field and forget a sheaf in the field, you shall not go back to get it; it shall be left for the alien, the orphan, and the widow, so that the Lord your God may bless you in all your undertakings" (24:17-19)

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WHAT HAPPENS IF WE NEGLECT OUR MEMORIES, HISTORIES, AND INHERITED IDENTITIES?

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THE DANGERS OF NEGLECTING THE PAST

- When we forget how precarity and vulnerability feel, we may be less likely to extend help to those in similar circumstances. Memory of hardship nourishes our empathy.
- When we forget our history of shortcomings, we may walk into the future without recognizing our profound capacity to damage it. Remembering our fuilures gives us humility.
- When we forget how difficult circumstances were overcome in the past, we might fail to recognize
 hope for overcoming them in the future. Remembering challenges that have been overcome fuels hope in
 adversity.
- When we forget the sweetness of liberation, we might fail to fight for others' freedom. Memory
 enlarges our generosity.
- When we forget our past, we may forget why engage in important practices (cf. Deut 5:13, which names freedom from slavery as the reason for Sabbath practice). Memory energizes purpose.
