


Fall Theological Retreat 2025





Bishop Emerita of the Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod, ELCA

In August of 2025, The Rev. Leila M. Ortiz completed a six-year term as bishop of The Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod of the ELCA and is currently "All but dissertation" with a concentration in Systematic/Contemporary Theology and special interest in Protestant Latinx Liberation Theologies and the impact of Latina hermeneutics on Lutheran ecclesiology. As of October 1, 2025, she



is serving as Pastoral Theologian in Residence at Saint Peter's Church in Manhattan, New York.

Rev. Ortiz has significant experience in global Lutheran theological dialogue, serving as a U.S. representative at The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) Global Theological Consultations in Wittenberg, Germany (2012) and Geneva, Switzerland (2016). During the LWF Assembly in Karakow, Poland (2023), she was elected to serve a five-year term on the council and appointed to the Ecumenical Relations Committee. In June of 2025, she was elected to serve on the, "Special Committee for the Augsburg Confession 500," to develop a framework that can serve as a compass for LWF Communion Office programs, member church participation, and preparation for the Assembly in 2030.

She is also a published theologian, contributing to "Global Lutheranism: Vitality and Challenges," co-authoring a chapter in "Faith on the Avenue: Religion on a City Street" (Oxford University Press, 2014), and publishing in Gather Magazine, Dialog: A Journey of Theology, and workingpreacher.org.

When not immersed in theological discourse or pastoral care, Rev. Ortiz enjoys exploring New York City's diverse neighborhoods and cuisine, hosting friends and family, and experimenting with recipes that blend her Puerto Rican heritage with flavors from her travels.

God is many things, but one of the first things they did was create. If we are made in God's image, then we are all creative beings. Let go of your hinderances, that F- in art you got in kindergarten, and your negative self-talk, and come join us to learn the art of "Artem Divina"—that is, "Divine Art." This spiritual practice includes reading or listening to scripture, listening to the Holy Spirit for words, images, or colors that come to mind, then spending time to rest and respond by creating. Artem Divina follows the same pattern of lectio Divina—read, reflect, respond, and rest.

Pastor Kristen will guide you in a short lesson on watercolor techniques, and then we will create using the Artem Divina template. All abilities are welcome and encouraged, as there is no right or wrong way to create!

In congregational life, we have historically stayed away from discussions of politics. But in our current world, where daily decisions are made that cause some people joy and others pain (especially to those on the margins), how can our faith-talk not engage the world of politics? And, as those called to steward Christian community, how do we do that wisely? Justin and Todd don't necessarily know the answer to this question. But in their congregations, they have tried to hold

healthy space for conversation about the place where faith and politics meet. Our conversation together will focus on the questions of wise stewardship of conversation, best practices, and holding the tension between faith and politics while maintaining community.

Waves of Change: Paying Attention to What's Shifting in Our Contexts with Deacon Travis Beck, Director of Worship, Music, & Arts at Mount Olive in Rochester

At any given time in our congregations and communities, there are incoming and outgoing trends, ideas, practices, and paradigms. What's emerging for one congregation may be fading away in another; what's tried and true in one community may be dragging another down. In this workshop, we'll wrestle with the question, "What's happening now in our contexts that we need to pay attention to?" We'll reflect on the waves of change happening around us, share what's making us hopeful or concerned, and explore what implications and opportunities we see as we look to the future.



C: We go renewed in Christ.




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


Monday Worship







A Liturgy of Joyous Rebellion: A Rite for Rededication to the Cause (adapted from *Liturgies from Below*, p. 344)

Family in the struggle, gathered together in the Spirit of Joyous Rebellion, I invite you to confess your commitment to the Liberation of all people and the restoration of the planet; and to renounce all obstacles that stand in the way.

Do you renounce greed, the love of wealth, and all of capitalism's empty promises? **We renounce them!**

Do you renounce oppression, structural and internal, and all the forces that keep us from living liberated lives, dedicated the liberation of all?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce the fear that dwells in you, all its insecurities—those things that draw you away from confronting your own oppression, loving your own neighbor, and building power for the sake of a liberated world?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce all answers to the cry of the oppressed that would belittle and chastise, like the saying, "Pull yourself up by your bootstraps," knowing that when we've been stripped of our boots, the answer is never isolated, individual acts, but structural, communal, and organized change; and knowing that, together, we are never alone?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce all the ideologies that would claim that some deserve to thrive while others, based on culture, class creed, or nation of origin, deserve a prison or a grave, a deportation or a desert wall?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce the destruction of the earth and its resources, the devaluation of nature, and the denial of climate change, as the planet is sacrificed for human greed, leading to pending and unimaginable calamity?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce racism and nationalism?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce sexism and ableism?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce xenophobia and elitism?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce the structural manifestations of all these things, promising to fight them within and all around us?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce any society or economy structured around the purpose of benefiting a few, while the many at the bottom are sacrificed for a bottom line?

We renounce them!

Do you renounce all these things?

We renounce them!

With all your heart, soul, strength, and mind?

We renounce them!

As we march toward liberation and life for all of Creation?

We renounce them!


The Lord be with you. And also with you.


Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.
